The General Assembly,

<u>Alarmed by</u> the fact About 275 million people worldwide (5.6 per cent of the global population aged 15–64 years) used drugs at least once during 2016,

<u>Noting with deep regret</u> that drug abuse rates are high as the government does not implement strong policies towards this issue,

<u>Believing</u> that because of high poverty rates many people don't have access to medical care and pharmaceutical drugs which results in the use of opioids, amphetamines, and stimulants,

<u>Emphasizing</u> the fact that there is a codeine and opioid epidemic that needs to be stopped by any means,

<u>Expressing its appreciation</u> towards the fact that many rehabilitation centers are taking actions and providing a public service to the people,

<u>Bearing in mind</u> that if this issue is not solved it will have huge impacts on the economy since illicit drugs contribute to the underground economy and the miscalculation in GDP,

<u>Welcoming</u> all delegates to sign and support this resolution to aid in decrease of drug abuse rates not only in Nigeria but globally,

- 1. <u>Calls upon</u> the UN to provide good public health care for the citizens as it will decrease the purchase of opioids and amphetamines
 - a. Within every village/area there will be a medical center fully equipped with medical supplies necessary in order to sustain the area;
- 2. <u>Authorizes a Tariff</u> on Opioids being imported from Afghanistan in order to
 - a. make opioids more expensive for people therefore decreasing its demand
 - b. allow less Opioids to enter countries;
- 3. <u>Recommends</u> an implementation of a technological system to be installed
 - a. This system will operate by having an online profile for each citizen
 - b. Each citizen will fill in their personal information and will have a QR code

- c. The QR code will then be used to determine how much quantity the patient needs according to medical databases provided by their doctors
- d. If the prescription is finished the QR code will stop working until the doctor renews the prescription;
- 4. <u>Encourages</u> the Legalization of Marijuana as it will not only provide a profit for the government and private business but also shall decrease drug abuse
 - a. The THC And CBD levels in the strain is easily controlled especially in third party ingesting systems such as vape pens, edibles, and oils
 - b. Since Marijuana will be legal people will turn to this option as many Opioid users will turn to this drug
 - c. Add a 5% tax on Marijuana products;
- 5. <u>Requests</u> that governments enforce strict policies about the use of drugs
 - a. Anyone who is caught with any sort of drug other than marijuana shall be fined 1000 dollars or more (depending on quantity) and sentenced to 5 years in prison with rehab;
- 6. <u>Further requests</u> the strengthening of rehabilitation centers and offer these centers as a public service;
- 7. <u>Authorizes pharmaceutical companies to produce a cough syrup with an extremely</u> low dosage in codeine or any mild opioid.
