

HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

a. How to become a part of the Historical Crisis Committee?

The first difference from regular committees and the Security Council is a country application. Where other committees are decided through the registration form, applications for countries in the Historical Crisis Committee are sent directly to the PRAMUN organizers. It is recommended that the delegates send more than one preference for countries/entities that are represented in the committee.

After the allocation of a country, the delegate will be asked to prepare policy papers for both topics containing *General background*, *Country's policy and possible solutions* and *Works cited*. This policy statement should be sent to your Chairs about a month before the conference (please note that this was scratched for 2022).

b. HCC procedures and rules

Historical Crisis Committee is something new to many PRAMUNers and therefore we find it necessary to explain how the session goes:

- First of all, there are fewer delegates in the Historical Crisis Committee than in regular committees and because of this, delegates get to / have to speak more often.
- Each delegate makes an opening statement right before the debate starts.
- The debate procedures are the same as in the Security Council: each delegate can ask to be added to the speaker's list and each delegate has the right to ask questions.
- It is very likely that during the session, an unexpected historical event takes place, so be ready to change your policy or your allies. **The goal is not to copy history, the goal is to alter it.**
- The outcome of the session is an agreement in the form of a resolution (one for each subtopic and one for each potential crisis). This resolution is created clause by clause (similarly to the Security Council).
- There are no preambulatory clauses.
- The clauses can be submitted by any delegate. In case of excessive production of clauses or disruptive behavior by one of the delegates, the chair can limit the number of clauses per delegate.
- The agreement along with the brief summary of the process in committee is presented by three delegates at the end of the General Assembly. Before that, the committee does not take part in the GA and, instead, keeps debating for another 90 minutes.
