# Environmental impact of major international events and festivals

## **Background information**

The main documents that sets the crucial rules for these types of events are:

- 1. **The Paris Agreement:** Primarily focused on mitigating climate change, this landmark agreement aims to limit global warming and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.
- 2. Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): Adopted by the UN General Assembly, the SDGs encompass a wide range of sustainable development targets, including goals related to climate action (Goal 13), sustainable cities and communities (Goal 11), responsible consumption and production (Goal 12), and more. These goals indirectly influence the way events are organized and conducted.
- 3. UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC): This framework provides the basis for international cooperation on climate change, guiding countries toward reducing their carbon footprint and addressing climate-related challenges.

For this specific topic or one that is somewhat similar haven't been adopted any resolutions.

Does any major festival or event take place in your country annually?

Does the organizing of international events make up a significant part of your country's economy?
